Kennewick Firm to Build Mesa School Land Draw At Mesa Set January 16 Publisher to Speak At Chamber Banquet Combined Contracts \$228,963

MESA--The Mesa drawing for veteran-preference farm units in Blocks 14 and 18 has been set for Wednesday, Jan. 16, at 2 o'clock at the Mesa schoolhouse. There will be some 68 family-size units in Block 14 and 24 in the southwest part of Block 18.

Burford Kuhns, Ephrata supervisor of land settlement for the Bureau of Reclamation; Loen Bailie, representing the South Columbia Irrigation District, and Melvin McInturf, representing the veterans, will conduct the drawing.

The Mesa Chamber of Commerce will present Glen C. Lee, publisher of the Tri-City Herald, as guest speaker. Ray Bailie, Franklin County Cattleman of the Year, and Paul Oberbering, Block 11, Franklin County Conservation Farmer for 1956, will also be present.

The Women's Fellowship of the United Protestant Church will serve cake and coffee.

Dimes Leaders Are Appointed

Appointment of community chairmen for the March of Dimes was announced this week by John Koster, Pasco, county chairman. Bernard Calfee will serve as Connell chairman. Stanley Nelson will conduct the drive in Mesa. George C. Goodman is Kahlotus chairman, and Mrs. Ola Waggoner is Eltopia chairman.

Calfee said the American Legion again will spearhead the Connell campaign for funds with which to combat infantile paralysis.

Last year Connell raised \$630; Mesa, \$461; Eltopia, \$440, and Kahlotus, \$120. Franklin County contributed \$7,500. The March of Dimes ends Jan. 31.

Block 14 Road Construction Due

Grant Construction Co., Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, was apparent low bidder on a contract to grade and surface 15.7 miles of road in Block 14, the State Highway Department said this week. The bid was \$79,903.

Burd and Bush, Ephrata, was low bidder on a contract to grade and surface a mile of Sagemore Road south of Eltopia. The bid was \$9,640.

SCHOOL HEARING TUESDAY

A public hearing on school matters will be conducted Tuesday evening in the Connell Grade School Multipurpose Room in conjunction with the monthly meeting of Connell Parent-Teacher Association.

School directors seek a consensus opinion of residents on a site for the proposed new high school. Directors have recommended for this purpose the farm unit purchased by the district. It is on

the west side of Connell. Supt. Charles M. Actor and directors will sit as a panel and answer questions on school matters. The Mesa building program also is expected to be discussed.

The PTA will confine its meeting to a brief business session, according to Mrs. Robert James, adjourning at 8:30 o'clock or shortly thereafter. The public hearing will follow immediately.

Basin Farmers Contend Larger Units Necessary

Testimony received at three hearings in the Columbia Basin will form the basis of a report to Congress in the event there is legislation to change the Columbia Basin Act, according to Fred G. Aandahl, assistant secretary of the Interior Department.

The majority of Columbia Basin farmers made pleas for larger units at hearings held in Mesa, Moses Lake and Quincy last week. Robert Billingsley, chairman of the Joint Boards of Columbia Basin Irrigation Districts, said in Quincy that the testimony constitutes a mandate for changing the Columbia Basin Act. He said the boards

would press for an amendment changing requirements to those of the 1902 basic reclamation act, which allowed a single person to own a maximum of 160 acres.

Representing Connell at the Mesa meeting were Lester Bauermeister, a new director of the South Columbia Basin District; Ben Klindworth, chamber president, and Hershel Spears. A number of farmers living west of Connell also attended.

Klindworth said that most of the farmers urged larger units but some who were operating two and three units said the financial return had been meager.

General contract for construction of the first unit of an elementary school at Mesa was let Thursday in Spokane to Murray Construction Co., Kennewick, by the Connell board of education.

The Kennewick firm's bid of \$160,815 was low among 13 bidders.

The mechanical contract was let to Grant County Plumbing and Heating, Moses Lake, on low bid of \$23,820. The electrical contract was let to Brown-Johnson, Spokane, on low bid of \$44,328. The building is to be heated electrically.

Eight firms bid on the electrical work and four on the mechanical, according to George M. Rasque, architect, in whose office the bids were opened.

The contracts are subject to the approval of the State Department of Education as the building is to be a state-aid project.

Construction will start, Rasque said, as soon as state approval is received. The contracts total \$228,963, "about what the estimates were," said Rasque.

To be erected is a brick veneer structure housing six classrooms, a multipurpose room, kitchen, office and other facilities. The architecture is comparable with the Connell Elementary School.

Board Supports Proposed Road

A proposal by the Yakima Chamber of Commerce for establishment of a secondary state highway from Vernita to Vantage was endorsed by Connell Chamber of Commerce directors at their monthly luncheon meeting Monday.

Yakima expects to sponsor a bill in the Legislature to provide such a highway along the west side of the Columbia River. The southern terminus would join with proposed Highway 11A.

Arrangements for the program at the Block 18 land drawing were placed in the hands of Lester Bauermeister, chairman of the reclamation committee, and O. S. Bailie, program chairman. The drawing will be held Wednesday evening, Jan. 23, in the Multipurpose Room of Connell Elementary School.

The board voted a \$25 contribution to the American Red Cross for Hungarian relief.

Wirth Shows Trip Slides

Facts and figures explained the colored slide pictures Gene Wirth took Connell Grange members and other interested persons on a trip Saturday evening, via the picture route, of the Ralston Purina Co. in St. Louis, Camp Minnawaca, Shelby, Mich., Alabama and Florida.

The 4-week trip to St. Louis and Shelby, Mich., the Danforth Foundation Summer Fellowship, was awarded to Wirth as an outstanding agricultural student at Washington State College.

Following the Fellowship trip, Wirth decided to take another month and view scenic spots, different crops and agricultural methods in Alabama and Florida. He chose these two states in particular as two of the youths on the Fellowship tour came from them, and also, he said, he figured they would be a composite of most of the southern states.

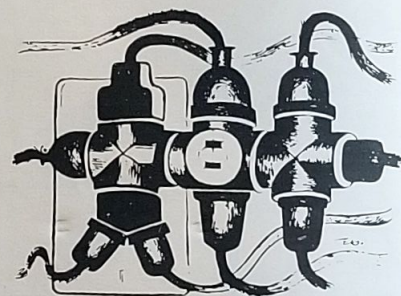

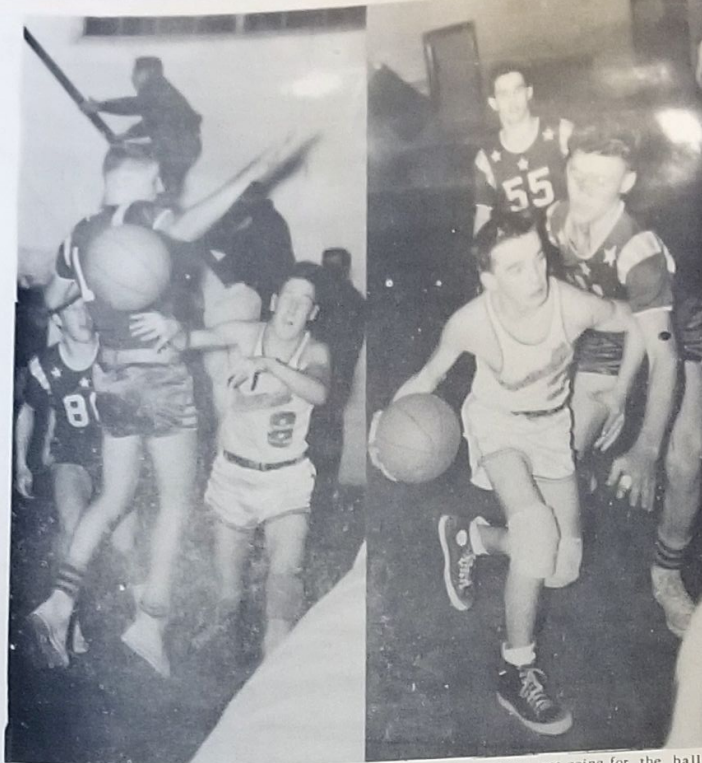
